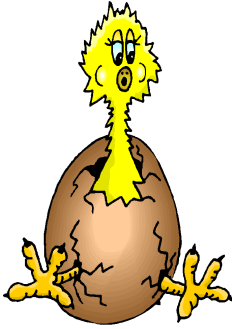

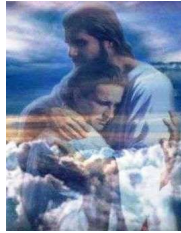

*"I can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13) (One of my favorite verses!)*

All of these passages help me to keep my mind in the right place and not get discouraged in all I try to do daily. The daily reading gives me the strength I need to get through each and every day trying to be like Christ in all that I do. Hopefully, I am successful sometimes and I inspire all that I encounter in my daily life.

Let us bring everything we do to the Lord. Listen to the Spirit's voice and ignore any discouraging voices we hear. Ask God for help as we take steps of faith. Remember God is on our side. His faithfulness is our shield.

I myself have asked many men and women to go on a Cursillo weekend and many have said "yes," but often they have said they are too busy or "it's not my thing." I still try to be their friend in Christ and not ignore them just because they said "no" at that time. I had one friend who came back years later and told me he was now ready to make a weekend. ### Catholic Lay Leaders

There are three words in the English language that I believe have been successfully diluted to our own detriment. The words are HERO, LEADER & CATHOLIC. **The first is the word HERO.** At least weekly you can tune in to the Today Show and Good Morning America and find a *new* hero. Sometimes it's a small child who remembered how to dial 911 when Mommy or Daddy were in trouble. The child is presented as a hero because instead of panicking, he dialed the three numbers. And, sometimes the daily hero is an animal. Oh yes, when dogs go barking to a neighbor and bring help to their master they are brought into our living rooms and presented as heroes. Although remarkable and commendable, they don't fit **my** definition of a hero. My definition of a hero is very simple: It is someone who risked their life or gave up their life to save others from injury or death. Jesus was a hero. He gave His life so that we all might live, not physically but more importantly, spiritually. Another example would be a corporal in the US Army who dives on a grenade to save others from the shrapnel, or Navy Corpsman who treats wounded Marines and then drags them to safety while under heavy enemy fire. Another example is the firefighter or police officer who puts themselves in harms way to save another. You get the picture.

**The second word** I feel has been diluted is the word **LEADER.** The media casually talks about our *leaders* in Washington. We currently have a lot of lawyers and politicians...but leaders? If we **had** leaders we wouldn't have to worry about the *economy* & the *culture*. What we have are people who are worried more about the next election than about their constituents who got them there. I'm sure you've seen documentaries or movies showing schools of fish in the sea. There's no perceived leader. They all look alike. They all turn right or left or up or down together, en masse. Isn't that how our politicians move, ...en masse...no one thinking for themselves?

I'd like to see leaders who are more like salmon fish who can **swim** against the current, **upstream.** Not following everyone else en masse, but going against the current with a purpose, a goal, an **ideal.** Some of my heroes are household names; people who not only swam against the current, but risked their lives for the greater good. George Washington and George Patton risked their lives on the battlefield. Mother Teresa risked her life in the disease filled streets of Calcutta. Pope JP II was shot by an assassin in St Peter's Square and later forgave that assassin in prison. And a little known Heroic Leader is Irena Sendler.

I believe one quality of a **lay leader** is someone who has a prayer life. Why? Because in the stillness of prayer, God speaks to us. And, He answers us. He is always in control. And in that quiet, a leader can be at peace, with his/her head on straight, while everyone else is losing theirs. And the leader can see clearly what his/her goal should be and how best to achieve it. It also helps if the lay leader has a spiritual director to keep him/her on course. My idea of a leader has the courage of his/her convictions. Not be wobbly like in a school of fish which change direction quickly and continuously. But someone who stays the course, popular or not, until his/her goals are reached. Can a leader change his/her mind? Of course. A wise person changes his/her mind, while the fool never does. But if the goal, the ideal is true and authentic, the course changes are moderate & then tweaked for the best outcomes.

**The third word** I believe to be diluted is the word **CATHOLIC** with a capital C. There is a big difference between practicing Catholics, those who attend at least weekend Masses, and those who don't go to Church. The latter ones are the Catholics I'm most concerned about & pray for. They're asked to fill out political surveys and answer the pollsters' questions, they check off the box that says Catholic, then answer questions counter to Catholic teaching.

They'll check off that they are pro-choice or pro-abortion, pro gay marriage, etc then the pollsters tell the media and the media have a "hay day" with that. Then they try to sway public opinion with the data. It makes our leaders look bad when they get up and tell it like it is. As you've read, some Bishops have excommunicated Catholic politicians for their vocal support and voting record when it is obviously anti Catholic teaching. When it fills their needs, our politicians will admit to being Catholic, while their voting records may define them otherwise. And when you look at their voting records, which I do, they're catholic with a small "c". That's why I believe the word **Catholic** is diluted.

When it comes to Lay Catholic Leadership, we need not focus on those in high places. We need to find it right here. Among us. I'm seriously talking about me and you who through our influence, our values and our personal example bring about the Christian Transformation of our Society.

And don't think because the title of this talk is **Leaders** that it may not pertain to you. On the contrary, It does pertain to you. Every one of us here has the potential to become a leader in our own environments,(by environments I simply mean our work environment, our leisure environment, our Church environment) by simply using our God given talents to orient, guide, and direct those around us. Our Baptism calls us to it, if we only listen.

The leaders **we are looking** for influence other people, they have likeable personalities. They have values, determination and perseverance. Lay Leaders are those who in the stillness, having heard the call of the Lord, throw themselves decisively into Apostolic Action. They are the ones who personify Jesus in their environments, in a clear, lively, convincing and truthful manner. They open the path to God for other people. A leader is one who influences those around him/her: a child, spouse, co-worker, friend, family member or business associate. **Their** decisions influence the decisions of others. These leaders are called "agents of change". Regardless of their status, rank or position, they recognize the need for change, and by their words and actions, they influence the attitudes and opinions of others around them, to achieve the desired change.

The Lay Catholic Leader must be continuously formed in the faith. The word formed or formation means to me means growth. He/she needs to take responsibility to form himself/herself and others. The leader never stops growing. He/she must grow in piety, grow in study and grow in action, to become a better Christian.

When it comes to Leadership, each of us is **unique** but we also share certain **natural & supernatural** qualities of leadership. **The natural qualities** we share in order to be effective leaders are: DISCIPLINE-WARMTH-INITIATIVE & GENEROSITY. By **discipline** I mean accepting God's will for us. We joyfully accept the discipline of our unique vocation as a Christian. By **warmth** I mean we're approachable, we're joyful. We always have that inner peace because we are open to the abundant grace of God.

We share the quality of **initiative.** The leader recognizes the need for positive change and takes the necessary steps to make that change a reality.

And finally **generosity**. A leader will always give of his/her time, talent and treasure as appropriate to meet the need.

**The supernatural qualities** that we share as lay Catholic Leaders are: A LIVING FAITH, HUMILITY, HOPE & LOVE. What do I mean by a **living faith**? A bold faith, trusting in the Grace of God to get things done. Knowing that we are His instruments and expecting everything from Him when we have given it our best effort. The leader with faith says: "God can do anything and it's exciting for me to be His instrument to get things done". It is to be conscious of the fact that WITH CHRIST, WE ARE AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY!

In Matthew 17:20, He reminds us, "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to the mountain, move from here to there and it will move. And the good news is, we don't need to move mountains....we simply need to move people; people's hearts.

**Humility** is the next supernatural quality. Believe it or not humility nourishes all the other virtues and facilitates grace. It is not arrogant to use our God given gifts. The humble person recognizes God as the source of those gifts and then accepts the responsibility to use those gifts properly and judiciously. Humility also recognizes that each person, regardless of their outer appearance has special gifts or talents exclusively theirs.

**Hope** is next. When all human hope ends, that's when the supernatural virtue of hope increases.

**Hope is to believe in the impossible...and live it ...as if it were a reality.**  
By having hope we make things possible. We overcome discouragement.

Lastly we share the supernatural virtue of **LOVE**. If **humility nourishes** the other virtues, **LOVE** gives **feeling, vigor and effectiveness** to the other virtues. Love catapults us into action. That action involves giving of yourself. Think of your hobbies or crafts. You may love to fish, cook, bowl, play softball, crochet, hunt, do crafts. It's your love that moves you into action & the action involves giving of yourself. You may go to Church and not love God, but you cannot love God and not want to be with Him where He's at in body and blood. You can receive the sacraments and not love God, but you cannot love God and not receive the sacraments in a very special way. Love begets action-action begets self giving. One can give without loving, but one cannot love without giving.

**SUMMARY**

Now what? Now that you've learned that **you** are the leader your environment has been waiting for. Now what? A little Doubt? Fear? Doubt and fear are not a bad place to start. Doubt and fear are natural human responses, especially when we're taken out of our comfort zone. Look at Simon Peter, the Leader of the future Church. Long after Jesus told Peter that 'Upon this rock I will build my Church', Peter exhibited fear & doubt. On that special Passover night, while his friend Jesus was being interrogated and beaten, multiple servant girls identified Peter as a friend of Jesus, and Peter denied knowing Him. Peter was as human as we are and as frail. Have you ever been Peter? Have you denied Christ? I have. I've been in the Dr.'s office waiting room reading my Magnificat when someone took a seat next to me and I conveniently hid the cover or closed the book entirely. I mean I should have been reading Sports Illustrated or ESPN Magazine right. Now I bring my Magnificat anywhere and everywhere. If someone asks what I'm reading I tell them: Inspirational Meditations. If they want to know more I'll tell them. There was a time when I was afraid to say grace with my family in restaurants. What would the waitress think? Now I say grace with my family & I kinda hope someone is watching, because maybe it'll motivate them. Like Peter, I recall a third time that I denied Christ. When I was out walking and saying the rosary with my little pocket rosary, I'd see someone coming towards me and I'd hide it. That wouldn't be cool to be praying and walking outside. Now when I meet folks I know, and they ask me what I'm doing I just tell them the truth. I'm going for a walk, it makes for great prayer time. Yes. **I needed to**

*experience a little bit of Peter before I could be a leader.* And I've had a lot of Peter moments to grow from. What the abundant Grace of God did for Peter's faith, worked for me as well. That same abundant grace is there for **all of us**. I have to admit though, when it came to the Sabbath, I have never denied knowing Christ. I've never shied away. As a teenager I always remembered to attend Church as well as during my 4 years of college & 5 years of active duty in the military. Rain or shine, vacation or business, I always gave Jesus that 45 minutes to an hour and fifteen minutes each week. I remember when I was in the Army Reserves and we had to spend one weekend a month at Fort Indiantown Gap PA, the Battalion Chaplain actually reported to me. I asked him what his duties were. He said he was basically the "Morale Officer", going from unit to unit offering a handshake and a smile and counseling to whomever requested it. I asked him if he did Sunday services? He said no, they never put it in the training schedule, not enough time. Well after spending 5 years on active duty and never missing the Sabbath services I certainly wasn't going to miss Mass as a member of a Reserve Unit (nothing against the reserves).

I saw the need. I took my case to the Battalion Commander and the S3 Tng Officer. They were not initially agreeable to the idea until they saw my plan, and then agreed that the execution of my plan would not cost the unit valuable mission time, would not interfere with weekend training objectives and actually easily fit into the training schedule. You see the tanks would go to the firing line by platoon. There are multiple platoons in a tank company and multiple companies in a tank battalion. From my active duty experience I knew there had to be a lot of waiting time. From then on, my Chaplain happily held services for the troops while waiting to go to the firing line.

For those whose tanks fired earliest, we caught them **after** they fired their tanks. This is what a little bold leadership could do. I called it a battle won for Christ.

I ask you now, take an account of **your** gifts. Combine the natural gifts you have with your supernatural gifts and respond to God's call in your environments. Fill the need. Not everyone can do everything, but each of us **can** and must do something! The alternative of course is best expressed by the 18th Century British Statesman Edmund Burke who wrote, "All that is necessary for the **triumph of evil** is that **good people do nothing.**"

You need not be a hero and you need not sacrifice your life. But be a Catholic Leader with a capital "C". Be bold. The world will receive the Good News of Jesus Christ through those whose lives radiate the joy, the peace, and the love and confidence of Jesus Christ. You are called to use your God given talents; To live out your responsibilities, & to engage in **service** to others.

Her physical absence was such a loss and one of continual sadness for me. We were (and still are) very close. Our husbands are like brothers to one another. The four of us often took combined vacations, enjoyed dinners and would get together often. Since their move south, those days are gone. Even though we speak on the phone frequently and visit once a year, it just isn't the same. Again, another "season" of my life.

I think about and reflect on all of my Cursillo and non-Cursillo friends I have had over my lifetime ~ some of whom have stayed with me all of these years while others have passed through my life. Even though some of these friends are no longer part of my environment, I am so grateful to have known them ~ if even for a short period of time.

As I mentioned, I lost my beloved twin brother. I have also lost my loving parents, dear in-law parents, many relatives and friends. Not having my mom or dad in my life saddens me immensely. I still want and need my *mommy and daddy* to offer me love, support and guidance ~ even though I am no longer a child.

The primary recognition for me is in my physical being. Why is my endeavor to try to lose weight a more difficult challenge? Also, I find I am at a point where I am now restricted with bodily limitations and not by choice either. I become physically tired during the day when babysitting my 8- and 4-year old grandsons. They are like the "energizing bunnies" who keep going, going, going and I feel like the tortoise from Aesop's Fables story, "*The Tortoise and the Hare*." I am, also, starting to develop more aches and pains in parts of my body that I never had problems with before.

Yet, God has a sense of humor in all of this. Doesn't He? God created the "*Seasons in Our Life*" so that they can be embraced, enjoyed, experienced, treasured and recognized. Our Faith Journey teaches us that!! We are all born ... we live ... we grow in wisdom and faith ... we return to God.

Life is a journey and one that God has already mapped out for each one of us. We don't need a GPS or Mapquest to lead us on our way. All we need is to follow Jesus. He knows what is best for us. Jesus fully understands all of the "*seasons of life*" we experience especially since He created these times for us.
