"What's the Emergency?" Spiritual Director's Comments

Dispatcher: 9-1-1 What is the nature of your emergency?

Caller: My wife is pregnant and her contractions are only two minutes apart.

Dispatcher: Is this her first child?

Caller: No, you idiot! This is her husband.

The truth is stranger than fiction (someone said that once; I didn't make that up!) and often funnier. This little 9-1-1 exchange reminded me that not every woman on the Cursillo will have a brilliant husband at home doing palanca, caring for the kids, cleaning the house, and praying fervently. Some of them will have been through a divorce; some may be widowed. They need extra support and care since Cursillo, like many things in the Church, is truly enhanced when it can be shared by a loving spouse. Even going to Church on Sunday is very painful for people who are alone or hurting (of course, not everyone who is alone is hurting—I happen to be very happy). What a wonderful example they give in taking the plunge and becoming part of the Cursillo community; after all, they didn't have a husband nudging (or perhaps, shoving) them into the process.

We all have different life-stories, different histories, different ways in which God touches diversity hearts. That reflects comprehensive nature of our God, for ultimately, only God can fill the deepest human yearning for love. For most people, that comes to them through the sacrament of marriage; for some, it comes primarily in other ways; for all of us, it comes through the Church. Thus, the community of believers needs to be a haven for fulfillment and consolation, for there is no greater relationship than one that is bonded by faith. Let each of us be that friend to all who call Church their home, for married or single, widowed or divorced, vowed or ordained, we all need one

another on the journey. Thanks to all of you who have made my walk through life so rich.

I recently traveled by car to Jacarezinho. I had to wait until I learned enough Portuguese to communicate. The palanca letter had a photo of the church and the name of the person that sent it. Luiza Larcher. But that was the only information that I had. When I arrived at the city, I drove around until I saw the steeple of the church. As I got to the church, Mass was just starting so I took a seat and fumbled through the service in Portuguese. After church, I asked the person sitting next to me if he recognized the name on the letter. After asking several more people, I found someone that knew Luiza. She was not at that Mass, but the person agreed to help me find Luiza. To make a long story short, we ended up at Luiza's house where I was able to meet her. We talked for a couple hours and ate lunch together. She had written the letter in Portuguese and had it translated by her son who speaks English. I have a photo of me with Luiza holding the palanca letter (see photo on page 4). We had a great visit together. She took her Cursillo 38 years ago.


