Thawed Hearts

As I write this, despite today's cold chill and icy conditions, the weather forecast for the coming week is a January thaw. It seems that almost every winter, in this coldest month of winter, there comes several days of warmth that soften the snowdrift and start the steady drip of melting ice.

Since we know that it won't last, it can be hard to appreciate. The skeptical refuse to really enjoy it because it will only last a couple of days. They refuse to let themselves be fooled. Those who are overly sentimental immediately set their hopes on an early spring. Neither enjoys the beauty of the moment.

Attending Cursillo can be like a January thaw. Some attend but inwardly refuse to really open their hearts fearing that it can never last. Some attend and give into the emotion of the moment. They thoroughly enjoy the weekend but then they drift away looking elsewhere for the next experience.

The reality of living a Cursillo weekend is that it opens the door to the possibility of living the richness of the fourth day. The weekend itself is not the goal of Cursillo. The goal of Cursillo is providing an encounter with the reality of the love of God experienced more deeply, with greater awareness through the richness of a life in grace nourished by the Sacraments. Like Baptism, Cursillo sends us out into the fourth day with the mission to share that deeper, more aware presence of God with all those we meet.

Let us all offer Palanca for those who will live their Cursillo weekends in the coming weeks that the weekends will not be like a January thaw for their faith, but rather a true and lasting springtime of heart, and that they will live rich and engaged fourth days that will bless themselves, their families, their parishes and their environments.
