Rushing to work, I was driving too fast and was pulled over by the highway patrol. The state trooper noticed that my shirt had the name of a local high school on it. "I teach math there," I explained. The trooper smiled and said, "Okay, here's the problem. A teacher is speeding down the highway at 16 mph over the limit. And so we adapt – but one constant is that Cursillo weekends continue to change the lives of so many women and men in Northeastern Wisconsin.
