Spiritual Director Reflection

Jesus stayed on shore to pray while His followers sailed on. In the midst of this wild storm, Jesus begins to walk out to them on the water. When the disciples see him, they think that Jesus is a ghost. Leaping to this conclusion probably sounds a little bit like the frightened yelps of Shaggy and Scooby Doo. Yet the reason the disciples thought they were seeing ghostly spirits is because the sea was believed to be a place of ghosts and sea demons.

Jesus assures them that it is he and they need not be afraid. Then Peter calls out to his teacher and asks that Jesus command Peter to walk on the water to him. What was he thinking? From the time I heard this story, I would often think how cool it would be to walk on water. Obviously, if I were to try it, I would go Ker Sploosh! That is why none of the other disciples dared to try to follow Peter. The boat was the safest place to be, and to leave it would be foolishness. Jesus tells Peter to come on out; the water's fine. So, in the middle of this raging storm, above a swirling sea of chaos that Peter and his fisherman friends thought might be home to ghosts and sea demons, this disciple does something that risks a spectacular failure: he steps out of the boat and onto the water. And it holds firm. Amazingly, Peter walks on water.

Jesus calls you and me to get out of the boat. When we talk about faith, <u>we often think</u> <u>about it as a noun.</u> We tell one another to have faith. We begin to think of faith as a possession, as if we could ever possess such a thing. In this mindset, faith slowly becomes a club to which we belong and not a way of living. <u>Yet faith is a verb.</u> It is what we do.

It is getting out of the boat and following Jesus with our whole lives. The essential question is not whether we are religious but whether we are doing something. To put it another way, the question is not whether we call ourselves people of faith but whether we are living out our faith in what we do. Are we building relationships? Are we putting God's goodness out into the world? Are we seeking to be peacemakers? Are we risking failure actually to follow Jesus with our lives?

The call to follow Christ is not just for people who stand at the pulpit, it's for all of us. <u>So,</u> <u>what is your boat?</u> How is Christ calling you out upon the water? That call does not have to be big. Maybe it is a desire to step more fully into a community that loves Christ, and that means joining a small group where you don't necessarily know everyone.

Maybe you want your children to know how important the way of Jesus is to you, and so you start talking more to your kids about faith even though they might roll their eyes at you and you're worried you won't have all the answers (and you won't). Maybe you care about the education of children in your parish, and you become a catechist. Maybe you help build a

house for Habitat for Humanity, send a card to someone who is sick, try to mend a broken relationship or sacrifice 15 minutes of sleep in the morning to pray.

Anything that brings God's goodness, love, peace, and hope into your life and the lives of others, no matter how ordinary it may seem, is walking on water. Christ is calling you out upon the waters to grow, to create, to build relationships, or to blaze some new trail. I don't know what it is God is calling you to, and it may be a thousand little things, but it's never going to happen if you stay in the boat. We have to get out of the boat and walk on the water!

We are excited to host another food drive on Sunday evening of the Fall Men's Cursillo. According to the Wisconsin Food Security Project website (https://foodsecurity.wisc.edu/background), children in Wisconsin are at higher-than-average risk of food insecurity compared to other states, and food pantries play a critical role in helping those struggling to provide healthy food for their families:

During 2015-2019, 19.5% of children, 11.2% of working-age adults, and 3.2% of seniors in Wisconsin lived in food insecure households. Nationwide, the comparable numbers were 16.4%, 12.1%, and 6.7%.

Food pantries and other sources of emergency food are a critical backstop when households run short on food. For some households, food pantries serve a shortterm need during an unexpected emergency. For others, they are a vital longer term resource. Communities that have sufficient emergency food resources—at convenient locations and times, with adequate supply and quality, and offered with dignity—can help struggling households maintain secure access to the food they need.

Please help support the Kewaunee County Food Pantry through our next food drive, which will take place on Sunday, October 1st at St. Mary's Parish in Algoma. Please bring a non-perishable food item or a cash donation to the business meeting and closing on Sunday evening. Bins will be located at the entrance for you to drop your donation.
