A MESSAGE FROM OUR LAY DIRECTOR



Remember the Ideals talk from our Cursillo Weekend? I often reflect upon this aspect of my Cursillo journey. The things I do in life are related to the value that I put upon them. For example, I value getting together with friends and family for the Christmas holiday to reconnect in the sharing of the dinner table, the giving of gifts, and the remembrance of the true purpose of the season.

For this Lay Director's message I want to talk about the value of Group Reunion. I've made a list of some of the things that are of value to me for Group Reunion.

- The Holy Spirit often speaks to us through others, especially through our friends who want the best for us. Sometimes I feel as though I hear right away, or days or weeks later, or more.
- When I am sharing with people whom I know are seeking the same path of finding God in their lives and spreading the Good News, I feel fortified so that it is not a lonely journey.
- God has a unique plan for me, as He does for all. Knowing this, that is, one size does not fit all, allows me to see the diversity within our Church and Body of Christ. I see this in Group Reunion. It helps me to relate in a more Christian way in the encounters of my everyday life.
- My Group Reunion meets in the early evening. Sometimes I feel tired at the end of a work day and consider not attending. However, I am motivated by the thought that perhaps one of my friends might need me to listen to them, they might need to hear from me, or I might need to hear from them. The sharing and giving aspect of Group Reunion is a Christian ideal.
- Friendship in Christ, praises Christ. Forging deeper friendships in the Group Reunion in His name, which is also an encounter with myself, is a form of prayer for me.
- Friendships can have ups and downs. Perseverance in the name of Christ can bring us to a new and more enlightened understanding of the gift of friendship.
- Most of us have encounters with people we might see as the far away, even within our own families. I am not always as effective as I would like to be in the environments of the far away. Sharing within the Group Reunion helps me understand and find pathways to bring the Good News to those places.
- Lastly, and my favorite, is from Matthew 18:20, "For where two or more are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

I invite you to consider your own reasons for being in a Group Reunion and to share them with your Cursillo friends.

I wish you, your families, and all your friends a most wonderful and Blessed Christmas of 2017.

The Cursillos in Christianity Movement began in Mallorca in the 1940's and has spread to more than 60 countries and more than 5 million people throughout the world. In the 1950's the basic service structures of the movement were established with the formation of Diocesan Secretariats. During the 1960's National Secretariats arose as a result of the need to coordinate and unify the life of the Cursillo Movement in each country. International groups have National Secretariats that are recognized by their respective Episcopal Conferences at regional, continental or linguistic level, and are approved by the OMCC

In the process of global expansion of the Cursillo Movement in the 60's, the need for connection and coordination between National Secretariats became apparent. International encounters of various kinds were held in different times and places. These international encounters gave rise to the CM International Groups.

The formation of an International Group was first discussed at the First Latin American Encounter held in Bogota (Colombia) in 1968. This became a reality at the Second Latin American Encounter of 1970 in Tlaxcala (Mexico), when the Latin American Group of Cursillo in Christianity – OLCC (now GLCC) was established. In 1972, as part of a World Encounter, the European Working Group, GET, (now GECC) was created and held its first meeting in Mallorca later that year.

In 1973, there arose a need for an English-Speaking Group, IELG to facilitate communication and publication of the CM's own literature in this language. Countries of the IELG included United States, England, Ireland, Canada, Australia, Korea and Sri Lanka.

In 1983, countries encompassing Asia, Oceania and American Territories in the Pacific held their first meeting in Guam, and in 1990 they were officially recognized by the OMCC as the Asia Pacific Group (APG). In 1998 the IELG further divided into the North America/Caribbean Group (NACG)

Every 4 years in rotation, an International Group selects one of its member National Secretariats to provide the Executive Committee of the OMCC. The following countries were elected for the term 2014-2017:

South Korea is the current coordinating country for the Asia-Pacific Group
Spain is the current coordinating country for the European Group
Venezuela is the current coordinating country for the Latin American Group
Information for 2014-2017 is not posted for the North American/Caribbean Group

Representatives of the Executives of the International Groups, and the Executive Committee of the OMCC, come together every two years to further the goals of coordination, unity, friendship and communion, and to fulfill their responsibilities towards their National Secreatories. Planned and accomplished activities are shared in the Reports of each Ex-




2017 National Encounter 60th Anniversary of Cursillo July 27-30, 2017

The 27th National Cursillo Encounter was held at Trinity University in the Archdiocese of San Antonio, TX. The Encounter was an enlightening and exuberant gathering of 740 Cursillistas from 7 language groups all over the United States to celebrate the 60th Cursillo Anniversary in the USA. This Encounter was blessed with the presence of 4 Bishops, more than 50 priests and deacons and 4 international guests. Jim and Martha Santos, and Joe and Lou Lysonski attended the encounter representing the Archdiocese of NY.

Among the topics covered during the encounter were: "Evangelization in the Environments," "Why We Have Cursillo," "Cursillo Past, Present, and Future," "Popes, Cursillo and Charisms," "Group Reunion and Ultreya," and "History of the Cursillos in the US." A special highlight of this Encounter was the presentation made by **Fr. Esteban Jasso, T.O.R.** – Cursillo #1 – 1957 – Waco, TX. Fr. Jasso was accompanied by SIX of the 16 original cursillistas who lived Cursillo #1 in Waco.

The Encounter was a great success.


HISTORICAL NOTE: The first Cursillo in the United States was held in Waco, Texas, in 1957. The key figures in the beginning were Father Gabriel Fernandez and two airmen from Spain, Bernardo Vadell and Agustin Palomino, who were training with the United States Air Force. Father Gabriel had arrived in Waco in 1955 from Spain where he had made his three days under two of the founders of the movement, Father Juan Capo and Eduardo Bonnin. The priest and the airmen were responsible for putting on the first two weekends in Waco. In 1959, the Cursillo spread throughout Texas and to Phoenix, Arizona. In August of that year the first national convention of spiritual directors was held, and their Ultreya magazine began publication.

He spoke of the unqualified love and bountiful spirit of his former Franciscan colleague Fr. Roch, and his many contributions to Cursillo and the Franciscan community. 
