



"The Match Made in Heaven"

Marianne: "I had been alone for 15 years and since I hadn't met anyone worthwhile to date, I had resigned myself to being alone for the rest of my life. But, after I lived my Cursillo weekend in November, 2011, I thought it would really be great if I was to meet a fellow Cursillista. I figured we would have a common base to begin a relationship, our faith in the Lord and our activity in the Cursillo

Jerry: "I had been divorced for 20 years, throughout which time God had been teaching me things and preparing me to be the person that He wanted me to be through friends, girlfriends and prison

ministry. Father Roch even asked if I would consider entering the deaconate. But, I always dreamed of being married again and feel called to serve God in some other way. But, on the other hand, I was questioning God. He knew I needed somebody in my life. I was wondering if that would ever happen. I knew that it was my will, but was it God's will? That was the hardest part to figure out. Then, I was asked to help out in the kitchen because they were shorthanded. So, I did. Then I saw this woman helping out on the kitchen team, and by Saturday night, I thought, 'Huh, there's possibilities', and the rest is history."

Marianne: "I was on the cooking team for the women's weekend in the fall of 2013. I was there on Thursday evening and saw two guys come in to help out with the team dinner and they ended up staying for most of the weekend. Over the course of the weekend, I found myself working closely with Jerry and felt very comfortable with him. We seemed to work well with each other, so even though I tried not to, I got my hopes up that maybe this guy would be the one I had been hoping for. On Sunday, I enlisted Jerry's help and we brought the leftover foods to the basement at Mt. Alvernia for the afterglow.

Later, at the closing mass, I sat towards the back with the other ladies on the cooking team. Jerry and Bob sat near the front of the church. We listened to the witnesses of the new candidates, which were very uplifting to hear. But there was one witness in particular that stood out in my mind. She started raving all about the food that was served that weekend and then pointed to Jerry and told him she was going to marry him. And Jerry stood up and took a bow.

During the afterglow, Bob and Jerry saw me and asked me to sit with them. Bob started telling me that they had Jerry's wedding all figured out. The wedding would be right here at Mt. Alvernia and I was going to be the caterer. So I leaned over towards Jerry and whispered to him that "I would rather be the bride" and he replied that I had a far better chance than the other girl did.

At the end of the evening, we stayed to help clean up and Jerry helped me load the food in my car to be taken to the homeless shelter. We said goodbye and Jerry handed me his business card and asked me to call him. We spoke on the phone a few days later and agreed to meet again at the harvest social the next Saturday. We had a fun evening. At the end of the dance, Jerry walked me out to my car. He told me he would call me and that maybe we could go out for dinner one evening, which we did the following Saturday. We found we had a lot in common and the conversation flowed very easily. There were no uncomfortable moments or awkward silences. I felt so right being with him.

We started seeing each other every weekend. I was concerned that the distance between us would be a problem. I live in Westchester and he lives in Orange County, an hour's drive apart. But it is working out quite well. We talk every evening on the phone and see each other every weekend.

I knew I loved him within a matter of weeks, and apparently he felt the same way. The day Jerry told me he loved me, he also told me that you really have to know a person for a full year before you know them well enough to make a commitment. Then he asked me if I would be willing to move up to Orange County. I said yes, but not for another 4 years. I explained that I was not willing to leave my job until I had reached the 10 year mark so that I could get my health benefits covered for life. So he agreed that was a good idea and we continued seeing each other on weekends.

On the women's weekend this fall, we marked the one year anniversary of when we met. Jerry finally could make the commitment, even though we had been committed to each other since the beginning. Saturday, after lunch, Jerry suggested we take a walk in the fresh air and sunshine. We walked around the grounds and talked about how beautiful it all was and how happy we had been since we had met. Then, we reached the front of the church and looked out over God's creation, the Hudson Valley and all the beautiful fall colors and scenery. Jerry got down on his knee and asked me to marry him and of course, I said yes!"

WILLS & OBITUARIES (A Message From The Development Committee)

WOULD YOU PLEASE CONSIDER LEAVING A LEGACY TO THE **NEW YORK CURSILLO ENGLISH** MOVEMENT BY INCLUDING A BEQUEST IN YOUR WILL AND/OR CONSIDER HAVING **NEW YORK CURSILLO ENGLISH** MENTIONED AS A MEMORIUM IN YOUR OBITUARY.

Have I gotten your attention? It has been on my mind for some time that there are many of us who are experiencing the winter of our lives. As I peruse the obituaries I am struck by the number of memoriums that are mentioned and I wondered why there are none that designate the Cursillo Movement.

I have been a Cursillista for 42 years and only once in that time have I ever seen or heard of such a memorium. After doing some research I discovered that the income derived from that one incident was \$17,000.

As a former Lay Director I receive many phone calls regarding the movement. About 8 months ago, an old time Cursillista who now lives out of the area called to tell me that he and his wife were revising their wills and since Cursillo had been such an important component in the development of their Spiritual lives, they wanted to remember the Movement with a legacy in their new wills. Could I give them the name of a person to whom they could refer? Of course I could!!!!!!

Some years ago, while attending a National Encounter, I met a man from another NY Diocese who told me that his community has so far saved \$185,000. They were hoping at some point to take over an abandoned Diocesan building for a pittance and using the money to refurbish it to have a place to have their own weekends. This is an immigrant community who are hoping to achieve their dream with their nickels and dimes.

SO WHAT IS OUR DREAM? To provide free weekends for anyone who would like to make a Cursillo Weekend. This is our ultimate goal. Is it attainable? Absolutely!! Had we been putting aside a small amount with each weekend when we started in the early 1960's and investing it wisely we would have 50 plus years of savings and perhaps today we would be achieving our dream.

As a member of the Development Committee, I recently attended a one day seminar on Fundraising. I discovered that for an organization such as ours there are five ways to raise money:

- 1. Fees: Attendance at Weekends
- 2. Raffles: Money raised at events and the yearly raffle
- 3. Sustained Membership: Monthly payments to a fund from Bank Accounts
- 4. Wills
- 5. Obituaries

Fees and raffles we are already familiar with and if anyone would like to sign up for a monthly deduction from their bank accounts, we would be happy to oblige. The money from Fees and Raffles will continue to go to general expenses to help us keep our heads above water

This scenario leaves us with Wills and Obituaries. Neither of these two options requires you to dig into your pockets at this time and since you cannot take it with you, the only requirements are that 1. You mention **New York Cursillo English** in Your Will or at least add it to a Codicil and 2. Make sure that your children know that you want the memorium in your obituary to go to **New York Cursillo English** and not the save the froggy fund. This money from Wills and Obituaries will be put into a reserve account and eventually invested so that it will grow until we can afford to offer free weekends to all.

I recently had a conversation with my children. I explained that my Spiritual Journey began with Cursillo and 42 years later it is still the path I follow. Cursillo became the anchor of my life enabling me to hold steady to the teachings of my faith no matter what storms battered it from the outside or how many doubts I experienced from the inside. I told them that I fully expect them to acknowledge my requests or they would have to live with the guilt of having denied me my last wishes.

Please recognize that there are many of us (including myself) who will never live 30 years or so to see this come to fruition, but what a wonderful legacy to leave as we know that whatever we donate will be going not only toward the growth of the Cursillo Movement but ultimately to the Spiritual growth of future generations. Would this not make God smile????

PreCursillo submitted by Lourdes Blanco



In its most simplest definition, Cursillo in Christianity is a catholic movement where, through friendship, its members introduce Christ to friends. Together they inspire to live a Christian life in this new Christian community.

Cursillo in Christianity strives to inspire the conversion of a person using three phases--precursillo, cursillo, and postcursillo. In the precursillo phase we identify, befriend, and eventually lead the person to a deep and personal encounter with Christ. I will say this again. In precusillo we identify, befriend and eventually lead the person who appears to be searching for something they believe will fill them with happiness ("their ideal") to a Cursillo weekend.

The preCursillo phase begins when you meet a person. It ends when you escort your friend to their Cursillo weekend.

How many times have we heard the phrase "make a friend--be a friend--bring a friend to Christ"? The phrase almost makes you feel like you can meet a person and immediately bring them to Christ. Truth is, for you to give a good precursillo, you need to spend time with the person and get to know them. This is key in the precursillo phase.

There is a spanish precursillo saying, that when translated sounds something like this: "First you become friends, then you become better friends. then you become still better friends. Then you bring your friend to Christ. " Precursillo is a process. It takes time. For a precursillo to be successful we need to get to know the person. We must spend time becoming a friend to them. We must take an interest in the person, get to love them, both physically and spiritually. We must show them, through how we live, the love we have for Christ and how present He is in our lives. We must witness to them and bring them into our environment, to our social and religious gatherings, into our Cursillo community. Once we have accomplish this and more, only then are we ready to bring our friend to Christ.

It is so exciting getting a potential new candidate. It is wonderful when the person we are bringing to Christ is a close friend of ours, someone we already know, love and trust. Sometimes we don't know the candidate well. Maybe they are someone who has seen you at mass and has gone up to you and said they wanted to learn more about the Cursillo weekend. Perhaps they were inspired by a flier they saw. Or maybe they read the awesome article written by Rob Reiser a couple of months ago about a Cursillo weekend. Perhaps they attended a meet and greet, coffee and bagel after mass pre-cursillo activity. When we first meet a candidate our job is to make friends with this potential candidate, not sign them up for the first available cursillo weekend. We need to become their friend. Their good friend. Bring them into our environment. Invite them to our social and church functions, our Cursillio gatherings, our family events, our Ultreyas. We need to witness to them, share our love of Christ with them, bring them into our Cursillo community. Get to know them and become better friends with them. Then we become still better friends. And once we have become better friends, then we bring them to Christ. It is a process. A process which can take anywhere from a several months to a year or more.

Early this year I met a woman who had heard about a Cursillo weekend. She was given my name and number as a contact person. I spoke with the candidate. She seemed like a really nice and pious woman. She was eager to experience the weekend and asked me when was the next women's weekend. Even though we had an upcoming women's weekend, I told the candidate that I did not yet have the dates for the women's weekend for the fall 2015 but that I would be thrilled to sponsor her and that I wanted to get to know her better and share what I could with her. We went out for coffee a couple of times. I asked her for her email and I have been including her in some of the weekly emails that I send out. I invited her to a prayer group I attend and I am getting to know her. We have not yet become better friends but I will keep working on it. Hopefully she will be ready to be a candidate for the women's Cursillo in the Fall 2015...

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...Who do we give a precursillo to? I have a sister I am very close to. We text, talk and email several times a week every week. She is not a Cursillista. I have been giving her a precursillo for about 3 years now. I have invited her to my Ultreya and have always extended an invitation to all the apostolic plans my group reunion has engaged in. My group reunion's apostolic plan has included organizing people to pray the rosary in front of Planned Parenthood, in support of the unborn life, traveling to homes with a pilgrim virgin, and sponsoring after mass meet and greet precursillo activities. Sometimes my sister has accepted and embraced my invitation. Sometimes she has declined. But one thing is certain, she is becoming familiar with my special group of friends. She likes the closeness we all share and has noticed how much we care and love each other. She is beginning to fall in love with my special group of friends.

So, who gets a precursillo? Every cursillo candidate, whether you know them for a day, a year or a lifetime.

In the spanish cursillo it is common for members of our group reunion to work together to give a precursillo to a candidate. They all witness and evangelize to the candidate. They all get to know and love the a candidate and often times once that candidate lives his/her cursillo, that candidate becomes a part of that group reunion. How much better is it to demonstrate our christian love for one another than by showing a potential candidate how much we love our cursillo family. By giving a precursillo with the other members of our group reunion we show with our actions how happy w are to be a part of the cursillo community we belong to. Our friendship with Jesus must be visible in our friendships with others. In Pope Francis' first Apostolic exhortation Pope Francis reminds us that we "should appear as people who wish to share our joy...(because it is not by proselytizing (prosaletizing) that the Church grows, but by attraction." As Cursillistas We are called to share the light of Christ we received on our weekend not just by telling people the Good News but by showing it in how we live. This is exactly what happens when our entire group reunion shares the responsibility of giving the candidate a precursillo.

Precursillo is a process of selection and preparation. When we fail to give a proper precursillo we fail our movement, the candidate, and even the cursillo weekend. Wanting to do a weekend in and of itself is not enough to go sign someone up. We need to love our candidate before we sponsor them. If we don't really know the person, we don't know if they are really ready or appropriate for the weekend. If we haven't made them a part of our family, a part of our environment, if we haven't given them a proper precursillo, prepared them with a view towards postcursillo, they may live the weekend thinking a cursillo weekend is some ordinary retreat. And it's not. Cursillo is a way of life. It's the new Christian community the is spoken about in the bible in Corinthians.

A good precursillo takes time. Sometimes a year. Sometimes 3. but If everyone gives a proper precursillo, our movement would be 1 million active and strong, our SOL would be filled to capacity, our Ultreyas would be vibrant and overflowing with Cursillistas.

Our Cursillo weekend changed us. It helped us to find what we were searching for in life. We became profoundly filled with joy as we deepened our relationship with our Maker. We understood that for us to be truly happy in life we have to include Jesus in all that we do, that if we want to feel and continue to feel the way we felt on that

3 day weekend, we had to abandon our old ideals and our old ways of living and learn to listen to God's word. It is through a good precursillo that we get our friend, our candidate, to understand Cursillo is a way of life and he or she is being invited become a member of our special Christian Cursillo community.
